

## **Trinity Tidings**

#### From the Rector

My first real day in the Holy Land was remarkable. Not because of the ornate churches, or the encounters with other pilgrims, but because I walked on the streets of Bethsaida. It's a village mentioned in the New Testament as the hometown of Philip, Andrew and Peter, and where Jesus, in the Gospel of Mark, restored the sight of a blind man. Leaving the group, I found a meditation garden. A rock sat in the middle of it, upon which I then sat. I pondered the man Jesus, his mission, his strangeness, his passion (both senses of the word). I sat, and prayed, and was thankful for the opportunity to walk where Jesus (may) have walked.

Moving through the pilgrimage, from village to village, church to church...this sense of beauty and mystery continued to grow. Many people buy keychains or magnets to remember their time. I took a different approach. From every significant location, every city, every village...I took dirt. Small kernels of dirt that remain for me a tangible connection to not just the spirit of the Holy Land, but the land itself. I also must confess that I 'broke the rules' at the Garden of Gethsemane and took a solitary leaf from the ancient olive trees that may have borne witness to the existential pain of Jesus on the eve of his passion. *Mea culpa, mea culpa, mea maxima culpa*.

Something happened in that land so long ago. Many things have happened since then, but for us...the life and work of Jesus is central to who we are and how we relate to that land. To be there in that land of beauty, that land of holiness, reflecting on the power and significance of Jesus, that nearly 2,000 years later we are still gathered around an altar giving thanks for who he was (and remains), what he said (and still says), and what he did (and still does)...its remarkable.

And make no mistake. That land is beautiful. The rolling hills broken up by ancient rocks and ruins. The chilly Sea of Galilee. The Jordan River, which appears different at nearly every place of encounter. The churches, the mosques, the temples, the calls to prayer at night...all of this swirls together in a beautiful collage of spirit-filled humanity.

But there is also chaos. Religious disagreements, conflicts over land, the constant use of martial force, the bloodshed...it takes such a beautiful place and leaves you frustrated. For all the while you are having a spiritual experience, you cannot forget the conflict. You cannot escape the chaos.

## FROM THE SENIOR WARDEN

#### Matthew 25:35-40

<sup>35</sup> For I was hungry and you gave me something to eat, I was thirsty and you gave me something to drink, I was a stranger and you invited me in, <sup>36</sup> I needed clothes and you clothed me, I was sick and you looked after me, I was in prison and you came to visit me.'

<sup>37</sup> "Then the righteous will answer him, 'Lord, when did we see you hungry and feed you, or thirsty and give you something to drink? <sup>38</sup> When did we see you a stranger and invite you in, or needing clothes and clothe you? <sup>39</sup> When did we see you sick or in prison and go to visit you?'



<sup>40</sup> "The King will reply, 'Truly I tell you, whatever you did for one of the least of these brothers and sisters of mine, you did for me.'

I love this part of the Gospel of Matthew as it such a basic reminder of what my definition of a Christian is all about. Yet, it is so easy to forget when I am caught up in my everyday life.

I had a hard time connecting to the Christmas story and everything that goes with it this year. That was troublesome for me, as that story, although we have heard it 100 times, can be and should be compelling and hopeful. That hope is real, at least I need it to be real. I want God to come to our world in love with the hope of peace and he did as an innocent human baby. The good news was first told to the shepherds who were the outcasts, the unwanted, the unpopular ones. I want that birth, the message of good news, and that joy to repeat itself and keep happening again in our world and in my life.

So here is where Matthew 25:35-40 comes in for me. If I want that good news to be spread and that feeling of hope and peace for our lives to exist, I need to do my part as a follower of Jesus. I need to reach out to the outcasts, the unwanted, the unpopular ones with the love of God. The Christmas story can go on and the miracle of God's hope can be felt through love in the world.

Help is needed to help with pots of soup each week, carrying them from cars to the kitchen, and to oversee set up and clean up when our guests host the supper.

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The Holy Land is, then, a metaphor for all of us. Deep, moving encounters with the memory and reality of Jesus do not happen in the abstract. They happen in the midst of chaos, in the midst of pain, in the midst of conflict.

It is this way for us, here in the serene beauty of Los Alamos. We live in a stunningly beautiful place. Every day I make the drive from White Rock, I am awed by the beauty I see. Particularly, when leaving the Hill, if I take the Main Hill Road, when that hairpin turn opens up and you see the valley carved deeply into the earth, my breath still catches a bit.

For you, the experiences of beauty may be different. Perhaps you have grown cold towards the land here. You still have beauty elsewhere. In songs that warm your heart. In friendships that sustain you. In books that help you lose yourself. Beauty is indeed in the eye of the beholder, and since most of us have eyes, we find beauty in things meaningful to us.

Yet, we also experience chaos. For many of us, myself included, 2019 has been a chaotic year. A year of transitions. A year of diagnoses. A year of pain. But that's life, right? Rain falls on the good and the evil alike, it says in our Book.

And here, at Trinity on the Hill, we all experience simultaneously the joys of beauty and the confusion of chaos. And we do this all while trying to grow as disciples of Jesus, as followers of the one who made such a difference way back when, and who still makes such a difference now.

So, too, Los Alamos. Everybody has a story. Everybody in our little village has a story that mixes both beauty and chaos.

Which, when I ponder it, makes me reflect on Jesus once again. Surprise, surprise, right? Like pilgrims in the Holy Land, following in the footsteps of Jesus, finding him in glorious churches and dusty roads, we are a people who have found Jesus (or is it better to say 'have been found by Jesus') in spite of the experiences of beauty and chaos we live with. Even when I was pondering the pain of the Holy Land, I still believed that the meaningfulness of Jesus, and the power of his mission, is worth clinging to. Though Jesus is not a quick cure for chaos, we gather around him, fixing our eyes on him, crying out to him to guide us through life. We gather around him at the altar, in the bread and wine, consuming him, metabolizing God as it were, becoming infused with his very life, that we in turn might go out into the world to share this life.

This is who we, as the congregation of Trinity on the Hill, aspire to be. Collectively, we have taken Jesus' mission as our own, contextualizing it of course for the uniqueness of Los Alamos. If we do not believe that Jesus is worth teaching, preaching, and sharing, then we might as well close up shop and head home. I mean this. There is literally no reason for us to remain a congregation if we ever lose our belief in the significance of Jesus of Nazareth. If we were to refuse his mission of the transformation the world, if we ignored his call to make visible the kingdom of God here on Earth, then we would simply be a social club of people clinging to the vestiges of religion while ignoring the vibrancy of life lived in the wake of Jesus of Nazareth.

I do not believe this is who we are. Though, I must confess, I do believe there is a possibility of us becoming such a place, just as I believe it as a possibility for all churches. For in a changing world, alongside the forward-moving and evolving nature of the life of the Spirit, if we cannot find ways to revive our collective commitment to the mission of Jesus, if we cannot find ways to adapt to changing social norms and cultural trends, then the danger of becoming an antiquated relic remains a distinct possibility.

In 1990, Souper Bowl of Caring began with a simple prayer from a single youth group:

"Lord, even as we enjoy the Super Bowl football game, help us be mindful of those without a bowl of soup to eat."



Since then, more than \$150 million has been generated for local charities across the country through Souper Bowl of Caring. It has become a powerful movement that has transformed the time around the "Big Game" into the nation's largest celebration of giving and serving.

Trinity on the Hill has participated almost since the beginning. Since LA Cares was established, it has been the local organization that has benefited from our offerings each year. In 2019 the congregation was very generous, resulting in \$861 being given out (a 32% increase in the year before).

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But, a possibility is never a promise. And I do not believe that this is the promised trajectory of our destiny. I believe, with all of my heart, that we still have a role to play in the manifestation of the kingdom of God in Los Alamos. In 2019, we welcomed new families into our congregation, some of whom came because of personal invitations by you, the people of TOTH. We endeavored to open our doors to the community in new ways, sharing the joys of our common life with the community. These statistics, these facts, and many others, are written about in more detail further along in the Annual Report.

The question on my mind is not, 'How well did we do in 2019?' For 2019 has passed, and we cannot change the past. The question I am wrestling with is, 'Who are we going to be in 2020?' And as God as my witness, the answer to that question depends very little on me. It depends on you, on your cooperation with the leading of the Spirit, on your continual growth as followers of the rabble rousing, leper-touching, dead-raising, boundary-shattering, rule-breaking, and God-incarnating Jesus of Nazareth.

Jesus is not done with us, because we are not done with Jesus. His work is not yet done, because Los Alamos is full of people trying to make sense of life alongside of their own beauty and chaos. The man who once walked the streets of Bethsaida, opening up the eyes of the blind, who met a shamed woman at a well in Samaria, who called tax-collectors and traitors friends, who turned over tables in Jerusalem, whose tragic death gave way to life beyond the tomb...he is here with us. He is here, within us. Here, he wears your face. Uses your hands and feet. Speaks with your voice. He is here. And he is calling you, once again, to go out there and continue his work of salvation and transformation.

May 2020 be the year in which we make Los Alamos its own kind of Holy Land. May you be emboldened by the Spirit and haunted by the dangerous memory of Jesus. May we see growth in this congregation, not because we want to pad our membership rolls, but because people of all varieties come to see that something is happening within these walls that transforms what is happening

without.

And this work begins by you asking one simple question: "What do you want me to do, Jesus?"

#### **Childrens Christmas Bazaar-Outreach Ministry Event**

Thank you to <u>everyone</u> who helped make this year's Children's Christmas Bazaar another huge success! So many people are involved that it is difficult to thank everyone individually, from the person clearing the ice on the lower parking lot to the clean-up team. So many activities take place in between; bringing donations, sorting them, staging the bazaar, greeting the parents, children and volunteers, baking cookies, wrapping gifts, clean-up, etc., etc., etc.! Many of our volunteers tell me that helping with the bazaar is one of their favorite Christmas-time experiences.

Our bazaar would not happen without the help of the many individuals, high school clubs, and neighborhood groups that continue to help year after year. And many of the young people helping were shoppers when they were in elementary school. I was delighted to have a group of the students and TOTH adults who stayed to clean up and pack everything away. They vacuumed, mopped, swept, moved tables, carried boxes, etc.. For the bazaar, we set up, hold the bazaar and cleanup within about a 24-hour period so it takes many hands!

We reached a bazaar goal this year of having 30 wrappers wrapping all at the same time. It takes some planning, volunteers and resources to reach a goal of that magnitude. Also, the staggered shopping times for children helped with less waiting in lines and a manageable number of children shopping at one time.

The back section of our sanctuary was used for completing gift tags, etc. One little boy asked Jo Moore "Is this a church?" and commented several times how beautiful it was. Wow! I hope that experience will help that family and child be comfortable in visiting our church or going to any church in the future.

Parents repeatedly thanked our hospitality team as they served coffee and cookies to the waiting parents. Families have made the bazaar their family tradition and have embraced what the bazaar represents for their family and children. They look forward to the bazaar each year.

The two recipients of the net proceeds were selected by TOTH children who attend Children's Chapel: LA Cares and Bread for the World.

May we continue to pray, "That our young people may learn to love charity, justice, and a gentle spirit, we pray to the Lord."
