Teachers Dig In

Dig In to the Bible

- Read: John 4:43-54
- In This Passage: A government official comes to Jesus, pleading for Jesus to heal his son, who is dying. Without even going to see the son, Jesus heals him just by speaking. As the father travels home, a servant meets him to tell him that his son is alive and well. Jesus is amazing, so we believe in him.
- Bible Point: Jesus is amazing...
- Application: ...so we believe in him.
- Summary Verse: "Worship the Lord with gladness. Come before him, singing with joy" (Psalm 100:2).

Dig Deeper

- You'll Be Teaching: Jesus is amazing. Kids may feel as if they don't get to see Jesus do many amazing things in their lives. But Jesus encouraged the father in the Bible story to believe even without seeing signs and wonders. Help kids trust that Jesus is amazing because of all the things they know he's done, and help them take notice of his small but no less amazing miracles, like a heartbeat or a beautiful day.
- Think About: What amazes you about Jesus? Tell him!

Dig In to Prayer

• Pray that kids would believe in the amazing power of Jesus.

Quick Tip

• When a lesson is a shorter story like this one, you may be tempted to simply open your Bible and read the passage aloud to your kids. It will certainly be less noisy, but it won't actively involve your kids. Help kids experience the Bible story using the activity blocks as written; they'll remember it and have an emotional connection when they feel like they were there with Jesus.

Welcome

- · Thank kids for coming.
- Just for fun, have kids give a high-one (high-five with just one finger) to three friends.
- Make announcements.
- · Introduce new kids.
- Celebrate birthdays by having kids say, "Long live [name of birthday child]!"

Introduce the Lesson

Say: Today we're going to learn that <u>Jesus is amazing</u>. Before we find out what amazing thing he did in today's Bible story, let's talk about amazing things we've seen people do.

Share

- Tell kids the most amazing thing you've ever seen someone do.
- Have kids form pairs. Ask kids to share about the most amazing thing they've ever seen someone do.
- After partners have discussed, ask two or three kids to share with the whole group what they talked about with their partners.

Summarize

Open a Bible to John 4, and say: We've seen people do amazing things, but no one is as amazing as Jesus! Let's explore the Bible to see what amazing thing he did in today's story. The Bible isn't like other books; it's God's special book. The Bible is one way God shows us how amazing he is. As we read his Word today, let's see how he helps us believe in him. Let's praise him for being amazing.

Pray, praising <u>Jesus for being amazing</u>.

Jesus Heals an Official's Son (John 4:43-54)

Supplies

- Bible
- large bedsheet

Easy Prep

• Identify a city or well-known location that's about 17 miles from your church.

Play Believe It or Not

Say: Today we're learning that <u>Jesus is amazing</u>, so we believe in him. Some things are hard to believe! I'm going to read some statements—some are true, and some are false. You're going to vote on whether you believe each one or not, and then I'll tell you who's right.

To vote, kids will go to one side of the room if they believe the statement and the other side if they don't believe it.

- When the person who invented the Frisbee died, he had his ashes turned into a Frisbee. (True.)
- A group of hippos is called a "chunk." (False; but "bloat" is one term that's used!)
- An eagle can kill a young deer and fly away carrying it. (True.)
- You can hear a lion roar from 5 miles away. (True.)
- If you mix neon green paint, white paint, and just a little bit of lime Kool-Aid powder, you can make your own glow-in-the-dark paint. (False.)
- The first hot air balloon passengers were a sheep, a duck, and a rooster. (True.)
- Pizza was invented by accident when a chef spilled a jar of tomato sauce and a bowl of cheese and they landed on a piece of flatbread. (False.)
- The first video game was invented in 1890. (False; it was 1958.)
- A blue whale's veins are big enough that a small child could swim through them. (True.)

Ask: • How did you decide what to believe?

Say: We hear a lot of things, and sometimes it's hard to know what to believe! We can't believe everything we hear, but one thing we can always believe is that <u>Jesus is amazing!</u> Let's look in the Bible to find out about a guy who believed in Jesus' amazing power.

See It From One Side

Have one child be the sick boy, one child be his dad, and at least one child be a person taking care of the sick boy. Have all these kids gather on one side of the room.

Choose an older child to play the part of Jesus. Have "Jesus" and the remaining kids, who will be the crowd, gather on the other side of the room. You can have as many kids as needed play the crowd and the caregivers so that everyone is involved.

Have two people (these could be tall kids or adult and teen helpers) hold up the bedsheet so that it divides the room in two, separating Jesus and the crowd from the rest of the actors. Kids on each side should arrange themselves so that they can't be seen from the other side of the sheet.

Say: **As I read our Bible story, you'll act it out.** We include general guidelines below for acting, but encourage kids to use dramatic flair and think of their own ideas!

Read John 4:43, and have Jesus walk back and forth on his side of the room.

Read John 4:46-47. The father will go around the sheet to Jesus' side of the room.

Say: Meanwhile, people were still trying to take care of the little boy. What things might they have done to take care of him? Encourage the caregivers to think of what their parents and doctors do when they're sick, and have them act those things out.

Read John 4:48-50. Have actors repeat the dialogue. Encourage kids in the crowd to react to this conversation; then have the dad start to head back.

Read John 4:51. Have the boy jump up and act all better, and have his caregivers cheer. Send one caregiver to meet the dad near the sheet and deliver the message.

Read John 4:52-54, pausing periodically for kids to act it out.

Have all the kids shout: Jesus is amazing!

Talk About It

Have kids sit down, and set the sheet aside.

Ask: • In our drama, you couldn't see what was happening on the other side of the sheet. How is that like what happened in the Bible?

- If you were *really* in the Bible story as it was happening, which side would you rather be with—the side with Jesus or the side that got to see the moment the boy was healed? Explain.
- If I told you right now that something amazing was happening in your house, would you believe me? Why or why not?
 - If something amazing happened right now, how would you know if Jesus did it?

Say: The father couldn't see for a fact that Jesus was telling the truth, but he knew that <u>Jesus is</u> <u>amazing, so he believed Jesus</u>. He headed home to see his son, who was all better.

And the father wasn't walking just a short distance, like across the room to the other side of a sheet; he and Jesus were 17 miles away from the sick boy! That's like from here to [name a place that's 17 miles from your church]. You can probably control some things in your house with a remote control—but only when you're home. You couldn't turn on a TV in your house from here! Jesus is amazing, and his miracle wasn't limited by him being far away. He could heal the boy without ever seeing him!

And the boy never got to see Jesus, either; he just got better even though he was far away! <u>Jesus is amazing</u>, and he can do amazing things even if we don't actually see him doing them.

Ask: • What amazing things would you like Jesus to do in your life?

Lead kids in a prayer for Jesus to do those amazing things.

Say: <u>Jesus is amazing!</u> He could heal a boy who was so sick that he was about to die. And he healed the boy without even meeting him! Jesus won't do everything we ask...but he *could*! Jesus has the power to do anything. <u>Jesus is amazing</u>, so we believe in him.

Discuss and Watch "Amazing Healing"

Say: Today we're learning that Jesus is amazing.

Ask: • What's something you'd be amazed to see?

Say: Let's watch the amazing thing that happened in our Bible story.

Watch "Amazing Healing."

Ask: • We talked about things we'd be amazed to see. Why do you think the government guy believed Jesus even though he didn't see the miracle happen?

• Share about an amazing thing you want Jesus to do for you. Share your own example first.

Say: <u>Jesus is amazing, so we believe in him</u>. We can believe that he's doing amazing things in our lives, even if we don't see them happening in really obvious ways. Jesus healed the government guy's son, but the man didn't even get to see it happen! In the end, he got to see that <u>Jesus is amazing</u> and truly had healed his son.

Easy Prep

Fill Plates With Water and Cut Toothpicks

Say: In our Bible story, Jesus did something amazing! Through Jesus' amazing power, a boy who was about to die got well and moved around again! Hold up a toothpick. Right now these toothpicks aren't moving, but let's see if we can make them get moving through water.

- · Have younger kids pair up with older kids.
- Give each pair a plate, and have an adult or teen helper pour water onto each plate so it covers the bottom completely.
- · Give each pair two toothpicks.
- Have older partners use scissors to cut the toothpicks in half to create four toothpicks that each have a sharp end and a blunt end.
- Encourage older partners to make sure their preschool friends don't put the toothpick halves in or near their mouths.

Make Toothpicks Move

Say: First, place one of the halves in the water with the sharp point forward. What happens? Have each child place half of the toothpick into the water to see if it moves on its own. Kids will find that it floats a little but doesn't move quickly through the water. Now let's add something special to power the toothpick through the water.

- Have each child dip the cut end of the other toothpick half into shampoo and then place it into the water so the sharp point faces forward.
- The toothpick will move quickly through the water in the direction the sharp end is pointing.
- If kids want to see the experiment again, have them pour out the water into the bowl and clean the plate to remove the shampoo completely before repeating the activity.
- If time allows, have kids form pairs, and give each pair another plate and toothpick. Have kids cut the toothpicks in half, add shampoo to the cut end of both halves, and race the toothpicks to the other side of the plate.

Talk About It

Ask: • How did the shampoo affect the toothpicks?

Say: One dab of shampoo made the toothpick do something amazing! And one word from Jesus caused the boy to get all better. Amazing! <u>Jesus is amazing</u>. When we see or read about the amazing things Jesus has done, our faith grows. We know that he really does deserve our praise and our trust.

Ask: • What's something amazing that Jesus has done in your life or in a friend or family member's life? How has that helped you trust him more? Share an example from your own life to begin. Say: <u>Jesus is amazing</u>, so we believe him and trust in him.

Do I Have to See Amazing Miracles to Believe?

Supplies

- Bibles
- timer or cellphone timer
- uninflated balloons (1 per child)

Set It Up

Say: Our Deeper Bible topic today comes from a question Jesus himself asked in our Bible story. Let's read it.

Read John 4:48.

Say: Jesus seemed a little frustrated that people needed to see amazing miracles before they'd believe in him. So what about us? Do we have to see amazing miracles to believe? Let's dig in to that.

Experience Amazing Miracles

Ask: • What's the most miraculous thing you've ever seen in person?

Say: Maybe you think you've never seen amazing miracles. But did you know there are hundreds of amazing miracles happening right now in this very room? Let's find them!

Try this. Put your hand over your heart, or find your pulse. Count how many heartbeats you have in 20 seconds. Tell kids when you're starting, and time 20 seconds. Have kids tell a partner how many heartbeats they counted. (Preschoolers may not be able to count accurately; that's okay. They'll still get the idea that their hearts beat faster after they jog.)

Say: **Now jog around the room until I say stop.** Time kids while they jog for about 30 seconds. Then have kids sit back down and count how many heartbeats they feel in 20 seconds.

Ask: • How many more heartbeats did you count the second time?

Say: God made our hearts to pump blood to the rest of our bodies. When we're moving around, we need our blood to pump faster, so God made our hearts so they could figure that out! That's an amazing miracle! If God hadn't made our hearts so they'd work just right, we'd die if we moved fast for too long!

Now think about your lungs. You never get to see inside your lungs, but they're at work all the time. That's amazing!

Ask: • How much air do you think your lungs can hold? Have kids use their hands to estimate.

Give each child a balloon. Have kids inhale as much air as they can and then blow up their balloons as big as they're able with just one breath. Have kids pinch the ends shut and compare their balloon sizes.

Say: God made us so that we need air to live, and he made our lungs so they can hold a lot of air. Plus, our lungs are able to refill quickly! If I gave you a giant balloon to blow up, you could do it just by refilling your lungs with air and blowing into the balloon again. The way our lungs work, providing us with plenty of air to keep breathing, is an amazing miracle that keeps us alive.

Let's try one more. Put your hands on your head. Do you feel anything moving in there? Pause. No? Well a lot is happening! Your brain has around 86 billion neurons. And each neuron can send 1,000 nerve impulses per second and connect with tens of thousands of other neurons. Those connections, or *synapses*, are what make your brain learn, think, react, and remember.

In the time it's taking me to say this sentence, your brain generated about three thoughts. In a day, the average brain thinks up to 50,000 thoughts! The way God made our brains is an amazing miracle!

Our hearts, lungs, and brains work all the time without us having to put any thought or effort into it. We have these miracles happening in our own bodies 24/7, and when we stop to pay attention, we become aware of them. Maybe we'd see even more amazing miracles if we stopped to look for them!

Dig Deeper

Say: We just discovered three amazing miracles, but maybe you want to see a unique miracle that doesn't happen to everybody. The Bible tells us about believing without seeing. Let's see what it says.

Read John 20:29 and Hebrews 11:1.

Ask: • What evidence do you have of Jesus being amazing even though you can't see him? Say: Here's how we can think of God even though we can't see him.

Read 1 Peter 1:8-9. Say: "The salvation of your souls" means that you can be forgiven and go to heaven if you believe in Jesus.

Ask: • Do you think that reward makes it worth believing in Jesus? Tell me why you answered that way.

Say: Even though we might feel like we don't see amazing miracles very often, we can read about Jesus' amazing miracles anytime we want. In fact, there's a reason they're recorded in the Bible.

Read John 20:31.

Ask: • Explain whether reading about Jesus' miracles helps you believe in him.

Say: The fact is, even people who *did* see a lot of miracles didn't always believe in God. In the Bible, the Israelites saw amazing stuff. Even after they'd seen God send horrible plagues on their enemies...and split a sea in half so they could walk through...and feed them food from the sky...and turn bitter water into good water...and a lot of other amazing miracles, they kept turning to other gods and not trusting the one true God.

Read Numbers 14:11.

Ask: • Why do you think seeing amazing miracles isn't a guarantee someone will believe in God?

Say: <u>Jesus is amazing</u>. Sometimes it takes faith to believe that, especially if we don't see God heal someone we love the way he healed the boy in our Bible story. But we can remember the amazing things he's doing all around us and believe in him.

Toss Ping-Pong Balls Into Cups

Say: Today's Bible story is about one of the amazing things Jesus did. Jesus healed a sick boy from far away. That's amazing! For us, being far away usually makes things harder. Let's play a game to see if that's true.

- Give each child a cup and a ball. Distribute the markers, and have kids write their initials on the balls. (Older kids can do this for younger kids.) Collect the markers.
- Have everyone line up along one wall in the room.
- Have kids place their cups on the floor in front of them and try to toss the balls into the cups.
- Whenever someone successfully tosses a ball into a cup, that person will move the cup farther away by 1 or 2 feet.
- Preschoolers may notice that they're not able to keep up with the older kids. Encourage them to do their best, and remind them it's not a competition.
- As the distance increases, successful tosses will become harder and harder.
- When tosses are unsuccessful, players will run to the ball, pick it up, run back to the wall and try again.
- If you'd like, play upbeat music while kids play.
- When it looks like everyone is stuck with a cup at an impossible distance away, allow kids to start over and play another round of the game.

Talk About It

Ask: • Why did the growing distance between you and your cup make things harder?

Say: Our game shows that doing things from farther and farther away gets really hard—maybe even impossible. That's not true for Jesus, though!

Ask: • Why do you think the distance from the boy wasn't a problem for Jesus?

Say: <u>Jesus is amazing!</u> He can help us even though we can't see him there with us, just as he helped the boy.

Jump Up and Back When You Make Eye Contact

Say: Today we're learning that <u>Jesus is amazing</u>. One of the amazing things Jesus did was heal a man's very sick son from miles away. That's amazing!

Seeing amazing things can make us jump with surprise, so let's play a fun game where you'll jump up and jump back when something surprising happens.

- · Have everyone crouch in a circle.
- For each round, you'll count to three. While you're counting, everyone will look at the ground and select another person in the circle to look at when you say "three."
- On "three," each person will look up at the person he or she has chosen.
- If two people make eye contact—meaning they've managed to choose each other—both people will jump up and back out of the circle. Encourage everyone to have fun with the game and be dramatic.
- As people move out of the circle, those remaining can move closer together and continue the game. When the circle has three or fewer people, start the game over with everyone back in the circle.
- If you'd like, play upbeat music while everyone plays as many rounds as time allows.

Talk About It

Say: In the game our reaction was to jump.

Ask: • How do you react when you see amazing things in your life? Share an example of your own, such as wondering if you really saw what you just saw and then being excited to tell others about it.

Say: What Jesus did for the sick boy was almost too good to be true—it was amazing. Jesus still does a lot of things that leave people wondering if they could be true because Jesus has the power to do anything. Jesus is amazing, and we can believe in him and his power to make miracles happen!

Double-Trouble Maze and Picture Accordion

Supplies

• For Older Kids:

- sturdy solid-colored paper plates (1 per child)
- o pencils (1 per child)
- o chenille wires (in a variety of colors)
- o scissors
- Mini Glue Dots
- o round beads that roll well (not pony beads; see Tip below) (2 per child)
- o markers

• For Younger Kids:

- o colored construction paper (1 sheet per child)
- o several child-friendly magazines
- o glue sticks
- o crayons

Easy Prep

- For younger kids, cut each sheet of construction paper in half lengthwise, and tape the 2 pieces together to create 1 long strip.
- Make a sample of each craft to show kids.



<u>Tip</u>

• For the round beads, we cut apart inexpensive beaded necklaces from the dollar store. If you use these, you'll need to trim right up against the beads.

Older Kids: Make Mazes

Show kids the sample craft you made. Give each child a plate, and set out the remaining supplies to share. Have kids follow these directions to make a maze.

- Using a pencil, draw three rings like a target on your paper plate.
- Erase a section about an inch long on two or three parts of each ring.
- Cut chenille wires to match the lengths of the lines on your rings.

- Using Mini Glue Dots, attach the chenille wires over your lines. Make sure you leave the erased parts uncovered.
- Use a pencil to poke two holes on opposite sides of your plate somewhere within the outer ring.
- Put two beads in the center of your maze.
- If time allows, decorate your plate with markers.

Older Kids: Play

Say: In our Bible story, Jesus was in one place but used his power in another place! That's amazing! Let's see how amazing you can be at focusing on things that are in two places at once.

- Have kids each place two beads in the center of the plate.
- Kids can twist and turn the plate to get both beads through the maze and into opposite holes at the same time.



Younger Kids: Fold Paper

Say: <u>Jesus is amazing!</u> In our Bible story we heard how Jesus healed a sick boy without touching him or even seeing him. Hold up the sample craft showing only the picture of the boy on the front. And because Jesus healed the boy, his parents and brothers and sisters and whole family believed in Jesus! Stretch out the accordion-folded paper to show all the pictures. Let's make this craft to remember our Bible story.

- Give each preschooler a length of prepared construction paper.
- Show preschoolers how to accordion-fold the paper, making six or seven large folds.

Younger Kids: Glue Magazine Pictures

- Have preschoolers flatten and spread out their paper strips in front of them.
- Set out the magazines, and have each preschooler search for a picture of a boy.
- · Preschoolers can tear out the pictures and glue them into the squares on either end of the paper strips.
- Then preschoolers can look for other pictures of people in the magazines, tearing them out and gluing the pictures into the rest of the squares.
- If there is time left over after preschoolers have glued pictures into all the boxes on one side of the paper, they can turn the paper over and decorate the opposite side with crayons.

Show preschoolers how to fold the paper strip again so that the picture of the boy is on top; then show them how to pull the other end to reveal all the pictures.

Talk About It

Ask older kids: • What was it like trying to control beads in two places at once?

• If you could be in two places at once, which two places would you pick?

Say: It's really hard to focus on beads that are in two places at once! But <u>Jesus is so amazing</u> that he could be in one place and use his power to heal someone in a completely different city! And when

people saw the amazing things Jesus did, so many people believed in Jesus! When we see Jesus at work, we and others can celebrate that <u>Jesus is amazing</u>. Whenever you play with your maze or accordion, remember that even though Jesus is in heaven now, his amazing power is here with you!

Have kids take their mazes or accordions home and play with them along with their friends and families as a reminder of Jesus' amazing power to be in one place and heal someone in another place, and how so many people believed in Jesus' amazing power.

Value Prayers

Share and Pray

- Have kids form mixed-age groups of four.
- In their groups, have kids tell about ways people have shown they value them.
- Next, have kids show value for each other by praying for one another. Each child in a group will get a turn to be the "Pray-ee." The other three kids (the "Pray-ers") will pray for the Pray-ee, thanking God for how he created that person.
- Kids can also pray a blessing over the Pray-ee. For example, kids could pray, "May God show you his love this week," or "May God give you peace this week."
- Make an announcement periodically to switch Pray-ees so that each child gets a turn.

Wrap Up

Pray: God, thank you for valuing every person in this room. Thank you that <u>you value people</u>. Help us value people the way you do. In Jesus' name, amen.
