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THOUGHTS FROM THE SENIOR WARDEN



The Call to Vestry Service, By Margaret Odell, Senior Warden

"Vestries should be one of the most exciting ministries in the church – joyful, in fact... Healthy, effective vestries make healthy, effective parishes. When rectors and vestries work together as a well-aligned team, extraordinary things happen for the mission of God." (*Vestry Resource Guide*, Episcopal Church Foundation, 2019)

I want to talk about what it means to serve on the TOTH vestry because it will soon be time to elect three new vestry members. After the Annual Meeting in January 2023, Ben Schilling, Michelangelo Lobato, and I will be retiring from the TOTH Vestry. All adult members of TOTH who are in good standing are eligible to be elected to the Vestry and your current Vestry welcomes either self-nominations or nominations by other parish members.

But what does it mean to serve on the Vestry? Vestry terms are normally 3 years and include:

- monthly meetings,
- retreats,
- financial support for TOTH,
- inclusion on the Prayer Chain,
- interaction with individual TOTH ministries,
- attendance at regular weekly services, and
- lots of prayer for the vestry, the clergy, and the parish.

Being on the Vestry, especially during a time of transition, gives you the chance to learn about every aspect of the life of the parish. In the absence of a permanent Rector, the Vestry collectively is the parish's fiscal agent and has direct responsibility for the financial health of the parish. This means:

- ⇒ attending to stewardship,
- ⇒ facilitating hiring and employee relations,
- ⇒ maintaining the TOTH physical plant,
- ⇒ interacting with the Diocese, and
- ⇒ supporting the clergy in matters of worship.

Before you start asking if Jesus was joking when He promised "his yoke is easy and his burden is light," being on the Vestry is not all work. The vestry has many opportunities for sharing moments of joy and celebration, as well as the privilege of supporting fellow vestry members, clergy, and parishioners during challenging times. Being on the Vestry is an incredible opportunity to learn about what goes into "the care and feeding" of a healthy, dynamic parish.

In the past 3 years the TOTH vestry has tackled:

- calling Fr. Raymond as our Interim Rector,
- replacing the sanctuary heating system,
- developing Covid-safe worship guidelines, and
- helping to hire new parish staff employees.

With the leading of the Holy Spirit, the 2023 Vestry will be instrumental in calling a new Rector and discerning the future direction for the ministry of TOTH.


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FROM THE CO-JUNIOR WARDENS

ALL SAINTS SUNDAY WILL HONOR ALL OF OUR SAINTS

For All Saints Sunday, November 6, we again will be assembling an *ofrenda* to honor those who have gone before.

The *ofrenda* (Spanish for offering) is a traditional Mexican celebration for the *Dia de los Muertos*, during which families create altars at home to honor ancestors. According to Wikipedia, the *ofrenda* dates back to the Aztec empire and was incorporated with Christian practices after the Spanish conquest, when the cultures merged.

If you look at the liturgical calendar, All Saints is November 1 and All Souls is November 2. The two days present a distinction between Saints and All the Faithful Departed. We make no such distinction, in keeping with St. Paul's direction that we are all saints in the community of Trinity on the Hill,. The collect for All Souls is this:

O God, the Maker and Redeemer of all believers: Grant to the faithful departed the unsearchable benefits of the passion of your Son; that on the day of his appearing they may be manifested as your children; through Jesus Christ our Lord, who lives and reigns with you and the Holy Spirit, one God, now and for ever. *Amen*.

We all share in the kindred of the Lord as God's children. We honor those who are no longer with us so, in addition to the reading of the names of those who have died as part of our observance, we'll have an *Ofrenda* before the Altar for that Sunday. The *Ofrenda* will display photographs and items the families of the church to remember those who have gone on to their reward.

Trinity on the Hill is a home for many families and those who have passed on will be honored and remembered during our Eucharist, and their spirits welcomed to the altar to share in our thanksgiving.

DO YOU WANT TO BE ...?

Father Raymond is putting together a list of those in the Parish who wish to be confirmed, received, or who want to have their Baptismal Vows reaffirmed by the Bishop, to request his next visitation to Trinity on the Hill. If you wish to be any of the above, please contact the office so we can have your information.

Confirmation – The sacramental rite in which the candidates "express a mature commitment to Christ, and receive strength from the Holy Spirit through prayer and the laying on of hands by a bishop." Those who were baptized at an early age and those baptized as adults without laying on of hands by a bishop are expected to make a mature public affirmation of their faith, recommit themselves to the responsibilities of their baptism, and receive laying on of hands by a bishop. Adults baptized with the laying on of hands by a bishop are considered to be confirmed.

Reception (Christian Commitment) – Baptized persons who have been members of another Christian fellowship and who wish to be affiliated with the Episcopal Church may make a public affirmation of their faith and commitment to the responsibilities of their baptism in the presence of a bishop. The bishop lays hands on each candidate for reception and says, "We recognize you as a member of the one holy catholic and apostolic Church, and we receive you into the fellowship of this Communion" Candidates for reception normally have made a mature commitment in another Christian fellowship.

Reaffirmation of Baptismal Vows – Persons already baptized may reaffirm their Baptismal Vows in the presence of the bishop in the context of a service of Baptism or Confirmation. These might be persons returning to the church after a period of unbelief or those who have entered a new level of spiritual life. This reaffirmation is another level of commitment than the "renewal" of the baptismal covenant by the entire congregation at various times in the church year.


Financial News

September Financial Results:

September unrestricted income came in at \$23,411—lower than budgeted monthly income of \$36,788. Fortunately TOTH's year-to-date revenue is only slightly lower than forecast and our expenses are significantly lower.

Shop On The Corner Focuses On Community & Friendship, by Kirsten Laskey (reproduced from Los Alamos Daily Post, October 24, 2022)



There is far more to be found at Shop on the Corner, located on the bottom floor of Trinity on the Hill Episcopal Church, than steals and deals on second-hand clothes or kitchen goods.

One thing that can be spotted is a close-knit camaraderie between volunteers as they sort through plastic bags of clothing or hold up an unusual gadget or doo-dad to brainstorm what exactly it is.

There is a friendly, family-like atmosphere in the store.

Volunteer Persida Ambarus (below right) aid she came to the thrift store as a customer and picked up a red chair, but she was so im-

pressed with everyone who worked there that she decided to volunteer, too.

Finally, there is a strong sense of community within the thrift store. Everything and everyone within its walls has a purpose: to improve the community locally, in the state and across the U.S.

The thrift store has changed locations; it moved to a new room in the church. Despite the new digs, its operations are unchanged.

Volunteer Sarah Rochester (above, right) explained a portion of the proceeds from the thrift store go towards Trinity on the Hill, while the rest is donated to nonprofit organizations across the country. Profits also will be given to communities that have been hit by natural disasters. For instance, Rochester said they recently made donations to nonprofit organizations in Florida to assist with efforts related to Hurricane Ian.



The store, which is open 8:30 a.m. to noon Wednesdays, clears about \$1,000 in weekly sales and raises approximately \$50,000 annually, she said.



Anyone interested in donating will find bins outside the Shop on the Corner. Pretty much everything is accepted, besides large pieces of furniture and electronics such as TVs.

"We have such a generous community," volunteer Pam Longmire said. "They are generous to us, and we are generous to organizations in Northern New Mexico."

Rochester agreed. "It's a wonderful community," she said.

Any items that are deemed unsellable are not wasted, Rochester said. She explained they will be donated either to Big Brothers Big Sisters or given to Bernal, a small community in San Miguel County.

Longmire said they get all kinds of donations including antiques that range from dolls and toys to scales. Ambarus said one time they were given 100-year-old letters.

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Ellie Giovanielli (previous page, top left), who has volunteered at Shop on the Corner for 42 years, commended the thrift store. "This is the best recycling we can do," she said. "It's about the only retail in town (and) we love meeting people." "We love the people we serve," Giovanielli added. "We are happy to give things to people who have nothing for no cost."
