Greetings, dear brothers and sisters in Christ! Fall has fallen, and with it comes heating work that has been and is being accomplished to ensure a smooth transfer to winter for the building and all its fabulous inhabitants who pray for a warm, cozy shelter in which to worship. To that end, the Office heating system has been repaired and is now ready for wiring in new thermostats. By the time you read this, work on the Kelly Hall and Undercroft heating system will have begun as well. Many thanks to Mark Hartman and Brad Wright for their involvement in meeting with contractors to get this project rolling.

You are not alone in noticing the floor shift in Kelly Hall, the cracks around the wall between the new addition and the narthex, and water leakage in the Undercroft. We have opened a claim with our church insurance to see whether they will pay for any repairs. The first step is to bring out, free of charge, a structural engineer to assess the problems. Stay tuned.

We are still working with the Scouts to get rid of their shed in our parking lot. By the time you read this, we should have resolved this issue or at least put a resolution in the works. Once that is done, we can get a dumpster in for Shop on the Corner, as well as start striping the parking lot before cold weather sets in.

Shop on the Corner has officially moved to the Old Parish Hall from the Undercroft and continues to be in business. This move includes coordination with numerous other ministry groups to clear out rooms to move to other parts of the church. This new location will hopefully give Shop on the Corner more room and better accommodations, as well leaving the more appealing-forrenters space in the Undercroft open and available to the church. Many shoppers have already provided encouraging, positive reviews. To all of you amazing ladies who accomplished so much in this move so very quickly, we are incredibly grateful and duly impressed. To the Parish, we encourage you to visit their new site when they are open to congratulate them (and hopefully find something to buy that takes your fancy!).

And while we are talking about this area, please notice that Judy Crocker has worked hard with professional landscapers to donate a beautiful garden and water redirection (read "a lot less ice in the winter") to the area outside the Undercroft. Where once stood dirt, weeds, and mud, we now have lovely plants, mulch, and water siphoned out from drainage pipes and away from the entrance. When you next see Judy, be sure to thank her for her dedication to beautifying our church and for her generosity.

ALL SAINTS SUNDAY WILL HONOR ALL OF OUR SAINTS

For All Saints Sunday, November 6, we again will be assembling an *ofrenda* to honor those who have gone before. Please bring photos of your loved ones to the church on Sunday, October 30, or drop them by the office during the week.

The *ofrenda* (Spanish for offering) is a traditional Mexican celebration for the *Dia de los Muertos,* during which families create altars at home to honor ancestors. According to Wikipedia, the *ofren- da* dates back to the Aztec empire and was incorporated with Christian practices after the Spanish conquest, when the cultures merged.

If you look at the liturgical calendar, All Saints is November 1 and All Souls is November 2. The two days present a distinction between Saints and All the Faithful Departed. We make no such distinction, in keeping with St. Paul's direction that we are all saints in the community of Trinity on the Hill, The collect for All Souls is this:

O God, the Maker and Redeemer of all believers: Grant to the faithful departed the unsearchable benefits of the passion of your Son; that on the day of his appearing they may be manifested as your children; through Jesus Christ our Lord, who lives and reigns with you and the Holy Spirit, one God, now and for ever. *Amen.*

We all share in the kindred of the Lord as God's children. We honor those who are no longer with us so, in addition to the reading of the names of those who have died as part of our observance, we'll have an *Ofrenda* before the Altar for that Sunday. The *Ofrenda* will display photographs and items the families of the church to remember those who have gone on to their reward.

Trinity on the Hill is a home for many families and those who have passed on will be honored and remembered during our Eucharist, and their spirits welcomed to the altar to share in our thanksgiving.

DO YOU WANT TO BE ...?

Father Raymond is putting together a list of those in the Parish who wish to be confirmed, received, or who want to have their Baptismal Vows reaffirmed by the Bishop, to request his next visitation to Trinity on the Hill. If you wish to be any of the above, please contact the office so we can have your information.

Confirmation – The sacramental rite in which the candidates "express a mature commitment to Christ, and receive strength from the Holy Spirit through prayer and the laying on of hands by a bishop." Those who were baptized at an early age and those baptized as adults without laying on of hands by a bishop are expected to make a mature public affirmation of their faith, recommit themselves to the responsibilities of their baptism, and receive laying on of hands by a bishop. Adults baptized with the laying on of hands by a bishop are considered to be confirmed.


Reception (Christian Commitment) – Baptized persons who have been members of another Christian fellowship and who wish to be affiliated with the Episcopal Church may make a public affirmation of their faith and commitment to the responsibilities of their baptism in the presence of a bishop. The bishop lays hands on each candidate for reception and says, "We recognize you as a member of the one holy catholic and apostolic Church, and we receive you into the fellowship of this Communion" Candidates for reception normally have made a mature commitment in another Christian fellowship.

Reaffirmation of Baptismal Vows – Persons already baptized may reaffirm their Baptismal Vows in the presence of the bishop in the context of a service of Baptism or Confirmation. These might be persons returning to the church after a period of unbelief or those who have entered a new level of spiritual life. This reaffirmation is another level of commitment than the "renewal" of the baptismal covenant by the entire congregation at various times in the church year.

FROM THE SEARCH COMMITTEE

We are now coming into the second, smaller, hiring season in the fall, and so our TOTH opening will again be posted in the Episcopal News Service and the Office of Transition Ministry (OTM) website for the month of October, with any applicants being considered before the Advent season begins. After that, Advent and Christmas pretty much occupies everyone's attention until next spring's hiring season begins. At Fr. Raymond's suggestion, we are going to expand the number of places where we post our opening, trying to cast a wider net.

In addition, the Search Committee is reviewing our OTM profile and website text to see if we can improve them. Clergy availability in the U.S. Episcopal Church remains challenging, as it is for many denominations, but we need to be patient and remember that we are on God's time here. Meanwhile, we in the parish can continue to move ahead in restoring our services and missions to their pre-pandemic levels as much and as fast as possible.

A great way to demonstrate your thanks, which also helps UTO's ability to award grants to Episcopal Churches around the country and overseas, is to drop loose change into the box, perhaps saying a pray of thanks.

All offerings are given 100% to the Episcopal Church UTO and will be given to those congregations who have applied for 2022 grants, following the theme :

"Care of Creation: Turning love into action by caring for God's creation to protect the most vulnerable - who will bear the largest burden of pollution and climate change - through justice, advocacy, environment reparations, or the development of fundamental materials."

Our parish ingathering will be held on November 6 at both services. So there are a few weeks left, enough time to pick up a Blue box and begin filling it with coins each time you remember a blessing that God has bestowed upon you. TOTH's delegates will take a check from our church that will represent all of our offerings to the Diocesan Convention Eucharist in Albuquerque on November 11. So please don't forget your box! That is also the first day of Standard Time, so you also have to remember to set your clocks back one hour!

Dr. Linda Raney will present a recital on the C.B. Fisk organ at First Presbyterian Church, Santa Fe at 5:30 pm on Friday, October 21.

The TGIF concert program titled *The Stylus Phantasticus* will feature the music of Frescobaldi, Froberger, Bruhns, Buxtehude, and J. S. Bach, specifically:

Buxtehude: Praeludium in C, BuxWV 137

Frescobaldi: Toccata no. 1 part 2

Froberger: Toccata, FbWV 102 in D

Bruhns: Praeludium in E minor ("Little")

J. S. Bach: Toccata and Fugue in D, BWV 565

Dr. Raney earned her doctorate in Organ Performance and Church Music from Indiana University. She has been the organist and choir director at First Presbyterian Church since 1986. She also has directed the Santa Fe Women's Ensemble since 1988. In 2017 she retired after 20 years as Director of the Santa Fe Symphony Chorus.
