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The Liturgy of the Palms

All gather in Kelly Hall. Once all are present, the following anthem is said, the people standing:

Officiant: Blessed is the King who comes in the name of the Lord

People Peace in heaven and glory in the highest

Officiant Let us pray

Assist us mercifully with your help, O Lord God of our salvation, that we may enter with joy upon the contemplation of those mighty acts, whereby you have given us life and immortality; through Jesus Christ our Lord. *Amen*.

Here a Deacon or another person appointed reads the lesson appointed

Matthew 21:1-11

When Jesus and his disciples had come near Jerusalem and had reached Bethphage, at the Mount of Olives, Jesus sent two disciples, saying to them, "Go into the village ahead of you, and immediately you will find a donkey tied, and a colt with her; untie them and bring them to me. If anyone says anything to you, just say this, `The Lord needs them.' And he will send them immediately." This took place to fulfill what had been spoken through the prophet, saying,

"Tell the daughter of Zion, Look, your king is coming to you, humble, and mounted on a donkey, and on a colt, the foal of a donkey."

The disciples went and did as Jesus had directed them; they brought the donkey and the colt, and put their cloaks on them, and he sat on them. A very large crowd spread their cloaks on the road, and others cut branches from the trees and spread them on the road. The crowds that went ahead of him and that followed were shouting,

"Hosanna to the Son of David! Blessed is the one who comes in the name of the Lord! Hosanna in the highest heaven!"

When he entered Jerusalem, the whole city was in turmoil, asking, "Who is this?" The crowds were saying, "This is the prophet Jesus from Nazareth in Galilee."

The Celebrant then says the following blessing

PeopleThe Lord be with you.PeopleAnd also with youCelebrantLet us give thanks to the Lord our God.PeopleIt is right to give him thanks and praise.

It is right to praise you, Almighty God, for the acts of love by which you have redeemed us through your Son Jesus Christ our Lord. On this day he entered the holy city of Jerusalem in triumph, and was proclaimed as King of kings by those who spread their garments and branches of palm along his way. Let these branches be for us signs of his victory, and grant that we who bear them in his name may ever hail him as our King, and follow him in the way that leads to eternal life; who lives and reigns in glory with you and the Holy Spirit, now and for ever. **Amen.**

As palms are distributed among the people, the following anthem is said:

Celebrant Blessed is he who comes in the name of the Lord.

People Hosanna in the highest.

The Procession

Priest Let us go forth in peace.

People In the name of Christ. Amen.

Processional Hymn: "All glory laud and honor"

During the procession, all hold branches in their hands, and at a suitable place, the procession may halt while the following Collect is said:

A Collect of the Passion (said by the Celebrant):

Almighty God, whose most dear Son went not up to joy but first he suffered pain, and entered not into glory before he was crucified: Mercifully grant that we, walking in the way of the cross, may find it none other than the way of life and peace; through Jesus Christ our Lord. **Amen.**

The Liturgy of the Word

Following the procession around the church, the people assemble in the Sanctuary. The people standing, as they are able, the Celebrant says

Bless the Lord who forgives all our sins

People His mercy endures for ever

Celebrant Let us pray

Almighty and everliving God, in your tender love for the human race you sent your Son our Savior Jesus Christ to take upon him our nature, and to suffer death upon the cross, giving us the example of his great humility: Mercifully grant that we may walk in the way of his suffering, and also share in his resurrection; through Jesus Christ our Lord, who lives and reigns with you and the Holy Spirit, one God, for ever and ever. **Amen.**

The Liturgy continues with the Trisagion (sung thrice)

The customary responses before and after the Passion are omitted.

The Passion Gospel is read by lay persons. Specific roles are to be assigned to different persons, the congregation taking the part of the crowd.

The congregation may be seated for the first part of the Passion. At the verse that mentions the arrival at Golgotha, all who are able stand.

Prayers of the People

As we journey this week with Christ and celebrate the paschal mystery of his death and resurrection, let us earnestly pray to God for those following the way of the cross and for all peoples everywhere.

Have mercy on us, O God, according to your loving kindness; in your great compassion, hear our prayers. *People*: Lord, hear our prayers.

We pray for the whole church, all leaders and ministers, and all the holy people of God. Wash us through and through,

People: and cleanse us from our sin.

We pray for our nation, for all the nations of the earth, and for all who govern and judge. Purge us from our sin,

People: and we shall be pure.

We continue to pray for the land on which we stand, the peoples, creatures, plant life and waters around us,

People: that the world may be restored

We pray for those who hunger, those who thirst, those who cry out for justice, those who live under the threat of terror, and those without a place to lay their head. Make them hear of joy and gladness, *People*: that those who are broken may rejoice.

We pray for all those in the armed forces, protective services and first responders. May the Lord protect them and those they serve,

People: that we all may be safe.

In this season of Lent we pray for those who prepare for baptism, and we pray that we all might be given the grace and strength to repent and grow closer to you, O God. Create in us clean hearts, O God, *People*: and renew a right spirit within us.

We pray for your servants Harrison Stephens, Cathy Walters, Malcolm Carr, and Pete Maginot, as they celebrate their birthdays this week; bless and guide them wherever they may be; Strengthen them when they stand; comfort them when discouraged or sorrowful; raise them up when they fall; and in their hearts,

People: may your peace which passes understanding abide all the days of their lives.

We pray for your servants who celebrate their anniversary in thanks for your love: Guard them as they grow and nourish them with your grace,

People: that they may grow close to you and to one another always.

We pray for those who are sick, injured or disabled; those in pain, those under stress, and those who are lonely, especially... Give them the joy of your saving help,

People: and sustain them with your bountiful Spirit.

We pray for those who have died, and who have entered into the land of eternal Light and your abiding peace. Cast them not away from your presence,

People: and take not your Holy Spirit from them.

Let us give thanks for the calling of the next Rector

People: Almighty and ever-living God, ruler of all things in heaven and earth, hear our prayers of gratitude for the calling of the Reverend Mary Ann Hill as Rector of Trinity on the Hill Episcopal Church. We pray you Gracious Lord, bless our labors to find a permanent home for Mother Mary Ann, that she might have a place to lay her head to rest from her efforts to serve you and this church as we seek to do your will. The Holy Communion

Once the Elements are ready, the People's gifts are brought forward and blessed with the following:

Celebrant: All things come of Thee, O Lord

People: And of Thine own have we given Thee.

The Great Thanksgiving: Eucharistic Prayer A

The people remain standing. The Celebrant, whether bishop or priest, faces them and sings or says The Lord be with you.

People And also with you.

Celebrant Lift up your hearts.

People We lift them to the Lord.

Celebrant Let us give thanks to the Lord our God.

People It is right to give him thanks and praise.

Then, facing the Holy Table, the Celebrant proceeds

It is right, and a good and joyful thing, always and everywhere to give thanks to you, Father Almighty, Creator of heaven and earth.

Here a Proper Preface is sung or said on all Sundays, and on other occasions as appointed.

Through Jesus Christ our Lord. For our sins he was lifted high upon the cross, that he might draw the whole world to himself; and, by his suffering and death, he became the source of eternal salvation for all who put their trust in him.

Therefore we praise you, joining our voices with Angels and Archangels and with all the company of heaven, who for ever sing this hymn to proclaim the glory of your Name:

Holy and gracious Father: In your infinite love you made us for yourself; and, when we had fallen into sin and become subject to evil and death, you, in your mercy, sent Jesus Christ, your only and eternal Son, to share our human nature, to live and die as one of us, to reconcile us to you, the God and Father of all. He stretched out his arms upon the cross, and offered himself in obedience to your will, a perfect sacrifice for the whole world.

At the following words concerning the bread, the Celebrant is to hold it or lay a hand upon it; and at the words concerning the cup, to hold or place a hand upon the cup and any other vessel containing wine to be consecrated.

On the night he was handed over to suffering and death, Our Lord Jesus Christ took bread; and when he had given thanks to you, he broke it, and gave it to his disciples, and said, "Take, eat: This is my Body, which is given for you. Do this for the remembrance of me."

After supper he took the cup of wine; and when he had given thanks, he gave it to them, and said,

"Drink this, all of you: This is my Blood of the new Covenant, which is shed for you and for many for the forgiveness of sins. Whenever you drink it, do this for the remembrance of me.".

Therefore we proclaim the mystery of faith:

Celebrant and People

Christ has died. Christ is risen. Christ will come again.

The Celebrant continues

We celebrate the memorial of our redemption, O Father, In this sacrifice of praise and thanksgiving. Recalling his death, resurrection, and ascension, we offer you these gifts. Sanctify them by your Holy Spirit to be for your people the Body and Blood of your Son, the holy food and drink of new and unending life in him. Sanctify us also that we may faithfully receive this holy Sacrament, and serve you in unity, constancy, and peace; and at the last day bring us with all your saints into the joy of your eternal kingdom. All this we ask through your Son Jesus Christ. By him, and with him, and in him, in the unity of the Holy Spirit all honor and glory is yours, Almighty Father, now and for ever. **AMEN**.

And now, as our Savior Christ has taught us, we are bold to say,

The Lord's Prayer

Our Father, who art in heaven, hallowed be thy Name,

thy kingdom come, thy will be done, on earth as it is in heaven. Give us this day our daily bread. And forgive us our trespasses, as we forgive those who trespass against us. And lead us not into temptation, but deliver us from evil.

For thine is the kingdom, and the power, and the glory, for ever and ever. Amen.

The Breaking of the Bread

The Celebrant breaks the consecrated Bread. A period of silence is kept. Then may be sung or said

Christ our Passover is sacrificed for us;

People Therefore let us keep the feast.

Blessed are those who are called to the Supper of the Lamb.

The Body of Christ, the bread of heaven. [Amen.]

Lenten Solemn Prayer

In Lent, in place of a seasonal blessing, a solemn Prayer over the People is used, as follows: The Deacon or, in the absence of a deacon, the Presider says

Bow down before the Lord.

The people kneel or bow their heads and the Officiant says the following prayer:

Almighty God, we pray you graciously to behold this your family, for whom our Lord Jesus Christ was willing to be betrayed, and given into the hands of sinners, and to suffer death upon the cross; who lives and reigns for ever and ever. *Amen.*

Sending forth of the Lay Eucharistic Visitor

Celebrant: We send you forth bearing these Holy gifts that those to whom you go may share with us in Christ's Body and Blood.

People: We who are many are one body because we all share in the one bread and one cup.

Celebrant Let us go forth into the world, rejoicing in the power of the Spirit.

People **Thanks be to God.**

Recessional hymn: "O sacred head, sore wounded"

The Deacon, or the Celebrant, dismisses them with these words
