From the Rector:

For some reason, I thought about the ending of an old movie today: was the seventies version of Jesus Christ Superstar. I remember watching it with some college friends, and one of them complained that there wasn't a resurrection scene. But I insisted (and still believe) there was one, in that version. It was just easy to miss. It comes at very end of the movie, after the crucifixion. All the actors have broken down the sets and have gotten back on the bus, and driven off. The



only actor we don't see, is the one who played Jesus. He's no where to be seen; not yet anyway. When everyone is gone, and the dust has settled, the camera moves to a silhouette of the empty cross with the setting sun behind. And then, slowly but surely, in front of the cross, comes a shepherd, followed by a flock of sheep.

Sometimes signs of the resurrection, of hope, of the reign of God, are hard to see. Vitality may be all around us, but we carry burdens that make it difficult to left up our head and see. Psalm 27 ends with these verses:

"What if I had not believed that I would see the goodness of the Lord in the land of the living!" O tarry and await the Lord's pleasure; be strong, and he shall comfort your heart; Wait patiently for the Lord."

What is the land of the living? On the surface, it may seem to be referring to this life, but I believe it means where and whenever God is present and working God's purpose out - and that's essentially everywhere and at every time. I believe one of our most important functions, as Christians, is to point to those signs of the Kingdom around us.

Did you know we have doubled our number of Sunday School classes? Yes, now we have TWO! I realize that doesn't sound like a lot, but believe me, in this day and age, that's a big deal. And it means we have more children. We also have new people joining the church. I've had five in Inquirer's Classes this fall. I wasn't even planning on offering one this soon until six weeks ago when we found out the bishop would be coming.

The Shop on the Corner has been hitting record sales numbers in recent months, allowing God's abundance to be shared not just here in Northern New Mexico, but also in disaster zones like Maui. And not only is that about the financial contributions the shop can make, but it also provides a way for people to find affordable clothing and goods. Our fellowship dinners are starting to meet again. We have intergenerational groups here, and that's not something I've seen in other churches.

Yes, we are in the Land of the Living. Because we live in the hope of the resurrection, and Christ has raised us to a new life of grace, we always are, but it's not always easy to see the signs. As we move further into the Fall, heading towards the great feast day of All Saints, and then on to the day of feasting that is Thanksgiving, I would like us to try and help each other to notice the signs of God's Kingdom all around us. Those reminders are ways to help us muster what we need to get through the difficult times.

Have you noticed all the changes going on around you in church? We are so blessed! We have a children's ministry that is exploding with kids and parents. We have so many new faces and families. We now have two, count 'em, two Sunday school classes because we have doubled in number. We have, by far, the finest organist in town (dare I say state?). Be sure to thank her when you see her! And thanks to Rick Rothrock for installing it. We are all about fellowship, whether in homes, in church, or in our gifts we bring to the church. 


TOTH August Financial Status

Greetings again from your friendly neighborhood Treasurer. I am coming to you again to with an update on this year's finances. Our annual revenue continues to fall short of our expenses. This month our revenues increased above \$30k, which we haven't seen since March; however, expenses were also high, partially due to having to paint the eves.

This year we have spent \$100,732 more than we have brought in. Our cash on hand, which is a calculation of how much buffer we have in our checking account, is down to \$46,620. Fortunately, we have money in our restricted accounts that we can draw from if we don't catch up by the end of the year.




The monthly data shows in more detail the month to month change.

Finally, here is the current status of the mortgage. With extra payments, we paid off \$3,459 of the principle last month.
