#### From the Rector: The Season of Gratitude



If I were to tell you that there are certain things I'm asked about over and over as a priest, I bet you wouldn't be surprised. Specific topics come up with understandable regularity. A lot of them have to do with death and dying, or the Church's stance on certain issues, or what exactly *is* an Episcopalian?

A few weeks ago, I was teaching Inquirer's Class in our parish library. The question came up about praying extemporaneously - or, more to the point, *how* to pray extemporaneously. I told the person to my right to please open the cabinet that housed the dry-erase board. Inside, there was the formula I give people for composing prayers, left over from our Book and Bible Study earlier in the week.

#### **CALLING ALL HELPERS!**





#### **TOTH September Financial Status**

Greetings again from your friendly neighborhood Treasurer. I am coming to you again to with an update on this year's finances. **Our annual revenue continues to fall short of our expenses**. This month our expenses fell down to a more expected level but our revenues also fell.




Below is a new chart that will help visualize our financial status. It shows the amount of money we have unallocated in our checking account vs. the deficit. When the deficit exceeds the cash on hand, we will have to take money from the endowment or restricted funds to cover the difference. This year we have spent **\$123,318 more than we have brought in**. Our cash on hand, which is unallocated funds in our checking account, is down to **\$30,511**.





This graph shows the total year cumulative revenues and expenses to see the big picture.

Finally, here is the current status of the mortgage. With extra payments we paid off \$3,459 of the principle in September. If this years trend continues we'll pay off the Kelly Hall mortgage within 8 years.

I explained that, while we can just talk to God when we are praying privately, if we are asked to pray in a group setting, and we don't have the Book of Common Prayer handy, we can use the form of a short letter.

You start with a salutation: Dear God/Heavenly Father/Gracious God, etc. Then you state some thing(s) you are grateful for. Then you add your requests or what we formally call petitions. Then you sign off "in Jesus' name we pray/through Jesus Christ our Lord/etc., Amen." (Amen meaning "so be it.")

So a prayer built on this formula might look like this:

Gracious God, we give you thanks for Trinity on the Hill. We thank you for all the opportunities you have given us over the years to witness to your love in Los Alamos.

Help us to bring others to know, love, and serve you. In Jesus' name we pray. Amen.

I have to be honest, there was a time when it never occurred to me that I should express some gratitude before launching into whatever I wanted to ask. Much of the time I was so focused on whatever my concerns were, that I was eager to get to it right away.

The person who taught me to start with thanks first, was a man in the first parish I served as a rector, named Keith Chesterton. Keith was one of those perfectly stalwart church members that are mentioned in the hymn "I sing a song of the Saints of God": dedicated, faithful, generous, hard-working.

Keith was the one who, along with his wife, made a deal with God that each year, when they made their pledge to the Church, they would increase their giving by ten percent. The deal was that, if there were ever a time when they couldn't afford bread for their children, they wouldn't give that week. Thankfully, that day never came. As you might imagine, Keith was the kind of person that made an impression on a young priest, and I paid attention to the things he shared with me.

So for the last twenty years, I have started nearly every prayer with some kind of thanksgiving. There has rarely been a situation in which I haven't found some-

thing to be grateful for. In a dire medical situation, you will perhaps hear me give thanks for the gift of modern medicine. When someone has died, I give thanks for God bringing that person into our lives on our earthly pilgrimage. When I am going through tough times, I give thanks for the lessons that I will learn and the growth that will inevitably occur.

This is not to say that there aren't times when things are so bad that I can't think of something. Like everyone else who prays at all, there are times when all I can manage is "PLEASE HELP!" And that's perfectly okay. We should never loose sight of Jesus on the cross, asking God to take the cup of pain and sorrow away. Jesus, in his humanity, is a comfort and pattern for us.

In this season of gratitude, what are you thankful for, despite the challenges you face? While it's true that it took six months for me to find a permanent home, I'm grateful for the temporary roof over my head; for getting to live in such an interesting community; for the natural beauty that surrounds us; and for a congregation that appears to be growing again. Just this last Sunday, we had several people in church whom I had not seen before. At our young families' potluck last week, we had 35 adults and children. From what I've been told, the number of families participating in the last year has more than doubled. And I know some of you have been inviting friends and family members to church.

If you struggle with finding things to be grateful about, please know that all of us go through that at one time or another. One thing that may help is including a prayer for God to help you see where his grace and loving-kindness is to be found. With the great 17th century poet and clergyman George Herbert, we may say: "Thou has giv'n, so much to me, give me one more thing, a grateful heart."
