Trinity Tidings

Dear Friends,



Can you believe we are 3/4 of the way through the summer? In just a couple of weeks, the new school year will be starting, earlier than in other parts of the country where I have lived. We have some things coming up in the month of August that I would like you to know about.

August 4 - This will be Sam McRae's last Sunday with us before she heads off to the Seminary of the Southwest in

Austin. She will be preaching one more time on that Sunday. Thank you to everyone who has shared in supporting and encouraging Sam. Learning to preach isn't something that happens just in homiletics classes; it's something that happens "by doing." I can tell you from experience (and I'm guessing many of you can too!) that one of the most rewarding and godly things that we can do as a community is to nurture persons going though the ordination process. Thank you for helping with this!

August 5 - Regular office hours of 9-5 resume

August 11 - Rabbi Jack Shlachter will be our guest preacher. As many of you know, Rabbi Shlachter is a physicist who worked at Los Alamos National Laboratory for over thirty years, with much briefer stints at Brookhaven National Laboratory in New York, the Atomic Energy Agency, and the Comprehensive Test Ban Treaty Organization. He was ordained as a rabbi in 1995. He was the rabbi and spiritual leader for the Jewish congregation in Los Alamos for many years, and currently serves in far-flung places around the world for things such as the high holidays of Yom Kippur and Rosh Hashana. He will preach at both services and be available for informal conversation in Sherrill Hall from 9:15-10:15.

August 18 - Instructed Eucharist. Every three years, when Year B of the lectionary comes around again, we have a month of Gospel readings that are taken from the 6th chapter of the Gospel of John. The theme of that whole chapter has to do with Passover - specifically with God feeding his people with the Bread of Heaven. The majority of Episcopalians come into the church as adult converts, with varying understanding of the sacraments. Having an occasional instructed Eucharist (i.e. narration interspersed between the major turning points of the liturgy that explain what is taking place) is one way to help us be on the same page. Worship is our reason for existing as a Christian community, and celebrating the Eucharist is what we do most often as the Body of Christ.

August 25 - Parish Picnic at Camp May. We are taking our parish picnic on the road again. This year we will be going up to the old scout camp, where we have reserved the pavilion. We will have a church camp-style service starting at 10:30, followed by lunch (hot dogs and hamburgers provided). There will be one service that day, and we encourage people to carpool from TOTH. If you would like a ride and don't know whom to ask, please check with us in the church office. Dress is casual of course. Bring a lawn chair, a dish to share, and a beverage. We have the space reserved all day so plan to come and stay a while. Mary Ann Hill

FROM THE SENIOR WARDEN

Happy summer! 

TOTH May 2024 Financial Status


Welcome to TOTH's financial status as of the end of May. Unfortunately, in May our revenues dropped and came in \$20,000 less than in April; fortunately, our expenses followed suit and were a little more than \$9,000 less than last month. This reduction in expenses seems to be related to reduced spending from ministries. There weren't any huge savings or missing expenses this month.



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Reduced revenue resulted in an increase in our projected deficit to \$23,049. This is the amount we expect to be in the hole at the end of the year or, in other words, how much we expect to overspend the amount we bring in this year. The Vestry action to withhold extra mortgage principal payments will provide the cash necessary to cover this deficit at the expense of extending the mortgage on Kelly Hall. Based on the projected mortgage principal withholding rate and the remaining months, we expect to have approximately \$25,000 withheld. Any deficit over that will have to come from restricted accounts, as we did last year.

Bishop Sean Rowe elected 28th Presiding Bishop, will begin nine-year term November 1

Rowe, 49, has led the Erie-based Diocese of Northwestern Pennsylvania since 2007, and also serves as bishop provisional of the Diocese of Western New York through a partnership the dioceses established in 2019. He previously served as bishop provisional of the Diocese of Bethlehem from 2014 to 2018. Originally from western Pennsylvania, Rowe is a Virginia Theological Seminary graduate and was ordained to the priesthood in 2000 in Northwestern Pennsylvania, where he served



in congregational ministry until his election as bishop. He currently serves as parliamentarian of the House of Bishops and Executive Council.

Rowe becomes the youngest bishop ever elected to serve as the church's presiding bishop. He also was the youngest Episcopal priest in the U.S. when he was ordained, at age 24, and he was the youngest member of the House of Bishops when he was ordained and consecrated at age 32.


Rowe is married to Carly Rowe, a Christian educator; they have a daughter named Lauren.

I wanted to tell you about All Individuals First, Inc. All Individuals First, Inc. has been making a huge difference in the lives of adults with developmental disabilities in Los Alamos for almost 10 years now.

I started All Individuals First, Inc. because I knew when individuals with developmental disabilities graduated from high school there were very few options for them. Many individuals would stay home and watch TV or sit and do nothing for hours on end. Our program gives them another option, we strive to get our individuals out into the community 50% of their time with activities like volunteering, recreation, shopping and participating in community activities. The other 50% of their time is spent on cooking skills, socialization skills and Arts & Crafts. Besides keeping them busy, the time away from home helped family members work, shop, relax and attend appointments knowing their individual was in a safe loving program.

We are doing some major fundraising this Summer. June 29th The Jemez Riders RC is hosting a Secret City Rally at North Mesa Park from 2-6 p.m., with proceeds going to All Individuals First. Then on July 4th, All Individuals First will be hosting a bake/food sale near the Lemon Lot for people waiting to ride the buses to White Rock. Finally on August 1st we are having our 10th Anniversary Dinner, Silent Auction, Raffle and games. Our goal is to earn \$20,000.00 to assist in our travel expenses off the hill by fixing the automatic lift in our van

and paying off the existing loan on our second vehicle. This would free up funds to provide our individuals experiences out in the community within a 3-hour radius of Los Alamos.

How can you help? We are asking for donations of items for our Silent Auction and Raffle in August, food items for our July 4th bake/food sale and our Anniversary dinner in August. Anything you could help with would be greatly appreciated and tax deductible.


