From the Rector:

Dear Friends,

Do you remember the show Northern Exposure? It was about a New York City doctor who ended up working in a small Alaska town in the middle of nowhere. Talk about a fish out of water!



One of the funnier episodes (in my mind anyway) had to do with the shopkeeper wearing a lighted visor during the darkest days of winter. It turns out that Sue-Anne had Seasonal Affective Disorder. That was the first I'd ever heard of that.

A few years later, I was living in South Bend, Indiana, and experienced "lakeeffect" winter weather. We had one sunny day in six weeks that year. And when my doctor diagnosed me as having Seasonal Affective Disorder I panicked because I thought I was going to have to wear a dorky visor every day. Thankfully, there were other treatment options.

I still get a bit morose if we have more than three cloudy days in a row, but living in Oklahoma and especially here in New Mexico helps a lot. But the short days and cold weather this time of year do impact people. A funeral director once told me that more people pass away between mid-November and the end of February than at any other time of year. Shorter, darker days can feel less hopeful. And the holidays, which can be magical when we are young, sometimes make us feel loss more deeply than at other times.

But I find Advent to be an antidote to the blues we can feel this time of year. Advent is a quiet season of hopeful anticipation that points, like John the Baptist, to a reality that is bigger and brighter than we can possibly imagine. Soon we will turn the corner and the days will start to lengthen again. We know that God, our God, is with us in the struggle. The future God has for us, individually and as the Church, is beyond anything we can ask or imagine, and it is just over the horizon.

As the calendar year winds down, I want to let you know how grateful I am to be here. I love this quirky community and I love Trinity on the Hill. I don't know about you but, despite the chaos we sometimes deal with out in the world, it seems like good things are happening all around us here at TOTH. In the last few weeks we have had fun and successful events like the Fiesta Dinner, the Children's Christmas Bazaar, and Advent Lessons and Carols. The energy and hopefulness around here is picking up noticeably. And many of our members have helped move our financial situation from precarious to more stable. That stability enables us to move in a direction of greater vitality and growth as we look forward to 2025. Thank you dear friends, for all that you have done and all you continue to do.

FUN FACTS ABOUT SHOP ON THE CORNER

- * *The Shop* opened its doors soon after Trinity on the Hill's congregation began. It's been a Los Alamos tradition for almost 60 years. Today our client base is still growing and the "secret" of the Shop is getting out.
- * It is one of the outreach missions of Trinity on the Hill.
- * *The Shop* has had many leaders, many of whom still volunteer with *The Shop*.
- * *The Shop* is the ultimate recycling center.
- * *The Shop* not only provides outreach for the church; it provides a service to the community through recycling, providing low-cost items to the community, and help to Northern New Mexico organizations.
- * Today we have approx. 33 active volunteers who give 2 hours or more a week to the work of *The Shop*. Many of these volunteers give 15-20 hours a week.
- * Our volunteers live in Los Alamos and surrounding communities.
- * In the early days *The Shop* might make \$35 to \$50 a week.
- * The Cerro Grande Fire turned *The Shop* upside down. It became a community resource for clothing and supplies. That year's Christmas sale netted approximately \$3000.
- * *The Shop* changed the Christmas sale to a sale that happens throughout late October to the end of December.
- * This year our goal is to reach \$100,000 in sales.
- * We donate to approx. 50 organizations and help during local, national and worldwide disasters.
- * 15% of our profits go directly to *Trinity on the Hill* to help offset the costs associated with this ministry.
- * We can always use volunteers, donations, and word-of-mouth help.
